Form of citation

Material in the Sudan Archive is given a reference number, which is unique across the collections of papers. Usually it is not necessary to give the name of the person or organisation within which collection the item is found, although it may be convenient to do so.

The short form of citation should be GB-0033-SAD.*reference number*

Most printed references take the form: SAD.*reference number* .

To order items in the searchroom, use the collection reference code(s), derived by removing the repository code (GB-0033-), followed by the reference number. Citing the section of the finding aid is useful.

"The Crown Prince's Jewels", by Gwenfil. Pseudonymous memoir of Philip Ingleson's First World war service with the Royal Fusiliers and as a staff officer with 198th Brigade, and also his periods on leave and events in his personal life including his courtship of his future wife Gwendoline Fulton. The memoir was written in the last years of the war and appears to have been intended for publication: units are usually not identified and personal names have been anonymised. Manuscript annotations, some identifying participants' real names, were added by Ingleson much later. The narrative makes reference to Ypres, Frezenberg Ridge, Passchendaele Ridge, Amiens, Hargicourt, Roisel, Peronne, Courcelles, Fouquaucourt, Cerisy, Harbonnières, the Hindenberg Line, Le Cateau, Landrecies, Sivry, Dinant; training exercises and the arrival of American troops are also described. Ingleson's service in France included time at Cuinchy, Cambrin, St Omer, Nieuport, Poelcappelle, the St Quentin salient, the Hindenburg Line, Le Cateau and the Sambre.
