Letters to Hornyold from Alban Butler, Richard Challoner, Hugh Kendal and Thomas Pierson, mainly concerning his forthcoming appointment as Vicar-Apostolic of the Midland District.

About the creator

John Joseph Hornyold was born in 1706. He was educated at Douai College and, following ordination, returned to England to serve as a missionary at Grantham. In 1739 he was appointed as chaplain to Longbirch near Wolverhampton. Five years later he published his first work, *The Decalogue Explained*, and subsequently published several theological works on the sacraments and the creed. In 1751 he was appointed coadjutor to John Talbot Stonor, Vicar-Apostolic of the Midland District; he succeeded him five years later. In 1768 he took on the responsibility of the running of Sedgley Park School which had been founded by Bishop Challoner six years earlier. He died at Longbirch shortly after the passing of the first Catholic Relief Act in 1778.

UC/P40/1 31 March 1751

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: boys' expedition, George Beeston's travelling and clothing expenses, George Littleton's dictionary, Butler's plan to go to Bristol to see John Talbot, and Bishop Stonor's invitation to Warkworth.

UC/P40/2 30 April 1751

Richard Challoner to John Joseph Hornyold: persuading him to take the mitre. 2f

UC/P40/3 10 May 1751

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: accounts for George Beeston's journey to London; hoping Hardwick (his successor) has settled in at Painslie with support from Sir Windsor Hunloke and Mr Conquest, and accusations against Hardwick of racing, riding and flirting. 2f

UC/P40/4 11 August 1751

Hugh Kendal to John Joseph Hornyold: thanking him for copies of his religious works, confident in Hornyold becoming a bishop.

William Green to John Joseph Hornyold: congratulating him on becoming a bishop, Rayment's fickle temper, and asking him to promote Bartlett's transfer to Louvain to assist the nuns.

Thomas Pierson to John Joseph Hornyold: his intention to go to Harvington, and answering Hornyold's questions.

UC/P40/7 24 December 1751

Richard Challoner to John Joseph Hornyold: thanking him for Mrs Giffard's charitable gift, seasons greetings from Bishop Petre and himself, Hornyold's diffidence about being a bishop, and the lack of respect from clergy to the bishops.

UC/P40/8 [March 1751]

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: Bishop Stonor's plan to allow Butler to attend the dying John Talbot at Bristol, Exley's involvement in disputes, Daniel with Lord Clifford, Adams (former pupil of Butler's) could supply at Painslie as neither Wilson nor Matthews are suitable, Butler's ill health, and Tommy and George Beeston's academic promise.

UC/P40/9a 18 February 1752

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: advice on a ceremony, W. Green's stay in Newport, Philip Butler to go to Lancashire, advising him to let Challoner see the Douai MSS at Harvington, Lady Shrewsbury's ill health, and agreeing to send Challoner and Green's answers to a case.

UC/P40/9b 22 February 1752

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: the belief by Challoner and others that the *traditio* baculi is not essential, Buxton a victim of a robbery, Lady Shrewsbury's ill health, and awaiting news about the Douai MSS.

Hornyold to Butler (draft on same sheet): his opinion that the *traditio baculi* is not essential but Stonor will supply the omission if required, Challoner planning to see the Harvington manuscripts, Layfield of Oscott overseeing his accounts, and Vaughan to go to Harvington. 2f

UC/P40/10 15 March 1752

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: the advice of the theology faculty at Douai stating that the omission should be supplied and Rome consulted, Lercari leaving the Cardinal Duke, the censure of the atheistic theses of de Prade, *Encyclopedia* now unfortunately allowed, and Lady Shrewsbury.

Richard Challoner to John Joseph Hornyold: thanking him for Mrs Giggard's £30, and asking him not to worry about the omission.

UC/P40/12 7 February 1788

Thomas Hornyold to [?]: money transferred to the recipient's account, references to Charles Butler, Constancia Clough of Lierre and John Hornyold, and dividends from South Sea stock.

UC/P40/13 [February 1752]

[?] (Rome) to a Carmelite prior: answer of the Papal Master of Ceremonies on Hornyold's consecration without the *traditio baculi*.

Richard Challoner to John Joseph Hornyold: thanking him for Mrs Giffard's gift, and seasons greetings from Bishop Petre and himself.

Alban Butler to John Joseph Hornyold: hoping to see Conquest on his return, Petre, Mostyn and Bishop returning from Paris, Butler to go to Bristol, and remedies for Hornyold's illness.
